At the corner of Cole Street and Marshall Avenue in the heart of Enumclaw, you'll find a place of hope. At POM, we focus on supporting those in crisis by providing basic needs such as; food, clothing, housing, emergency financial assistance and extended case management, including counseling referrals, for issues causing crises. We also walk alongside our clients with individual case management to best address each person's unique needs.

Plateau Outreach Ministries is a non-profit organization that was formed in 1998 to assist neighbors in crisis. It began with one, initial gift from the Estate of Catherine A. Kohl, who asked that the elderly in the community be taken care of. Today, the services provided by POM extend beyond senior citizens to children, individuals and families--all of our neighbors in need of assistance.





2021 Food Bank Recipients*




2021 Samaritan Services Recipients



COVID-19

almost two years later





When COVID-19 was declared a global pandemic by the World Health Organization in March 2020, we had no idea how much our every day way of life was about to change. Now, almost two years later, COVID-19 (and it's multiple variants) continue to be our "new normal". But that hasn't stopped POM.

We continued to host Food Bank drive-thru style, seeing on average, a total of 72 families a week. We also continued our partnership with Door Dash, to reach those individuals and families who were unable to leave their homes, serving an average of 35 a week.

Our case management, or Samaritan Services, continued to be held mostly over the phone.

Unfortunately, due to restrictions, Winter Shelter was cancelled and we were unable to provide hot showers or laundry services to those clients who are unsheltered.





Cryptocurrency






Finanical Review
